

So, everything's big in Texas, right? Well, the beautiful State Capitol certainly lives up to this reputation. Completed in 1888, this National Historic Landmark is the largest in gross square footage of all 50 state capitols, and is second in total size only to the National Capitol in Washington DC. Views from the capitol dome allow visitors to take in much of the Austin's cityscape and the beautiful surrounding environments — you'll forget you're in the great state of Texas!

One of 13 Presidential Libraries administered by the National Archives and Records Administration, the Lyndon Baines Johnson Presidential Library offers a look into the life, work, and legacy of America's 36th president. Situated within the campus of the University of Texas, highlights here include the chance to see a replica Oval Office as it was during Johnson's administration. In addition to exhibitions dedicated to the ex-president, the library puts on shows focused on culturally significant happenings that took place while LBJ was in office.

With perennially trendy South Congress Avenue as its spine, the SoCo District is the principal destination for the hippest happenings in town, and home to some of the city's best and most iconic indie businesses, music venues, restaurants, and watering holes.

If you want to see this city live up to its claim of being the 'live music capital of the world,' you'd be off to a good start by looking into the lineup at Austin City Limits Live while you're in town. It's one of the premier live music venues in the city, and hosts some of the world's greatest performing artists on its fabled stage.

Every summer night, hundreds of people gather to see the world's largest urban bat colony emerge from under the Congress Avenue Bridge in downtown Austin, Texas. These 1.5 million bats are fun to watch, but they're also making our world a better place to live.

When engineers reconstructed the Congress Avenue Bridge in 1980 they had no idea that new crevices beneath the bridge would make an ideal bat roost. Although bats had lived there for years, it was headline news when they suddenly began moving in by the thousands. Reacting in fear and ignorance, many people petitioned to have the bat colony eradicated.

About that time, Merlin Tuttle brought BCI to Austin and told the city the surprising truth: that bats are gentle and incredibly sophisticated animals; that bat-watchers have nothing to fear if they don't try to handle bats; and that on the nightly flights out from under the bridge, the Austin bats eat from 10,000 to 20,000 pounds of insects, including agricultural pests.

As the city came to appreciate its bats, the population under the Congress Avenue Bridge grew to be the largest urban bat colony in North America. With up to 1.5 million bats spiraling into the summer skies, Austin now has one of the most unusual and fascinating tourist attractions anywhere.
